Ms. Karim shared her personal healthcare journey into midwifery before delving into the definition of midwife, where they work, and what they do. After her personal experiences, Ms. Karim strives to help women find a shared voice in decision making regarding their pregnancy. Programs she covered include Pregnancy Medical homes, Pregnancy Care Managers, Reproductive Life Planning, and others.
