As the General Assembly has turned to counties as the instrumentalities to provide certain services over the entire state, it has recognized that its goal of statewide provision of those services cannot be met unless the counties are required to provide the services. Therefore, counties are subject to a number of service mandates, which in total comprise well over half of any county's annual budget. For many of these mandated activities, there is also a substantial degree of state government supervision of county operations.

## **Helpful Tips to Navigate Human Services:**

- ✓ Counties and Towns are like foreign countries. Services vary greatly across municipalities. Do not assume services are alike or transferable across municipalities.
- ✓ Some counties have consolidated their social services and public health departments. Others have consolidated these two departments plus others (aging, veterans, transportation, etc.). Their names may be different.
- ✓ Be proactive and get to know your local health and human services directors and service providers by name. Ask them for a list of point persons. Once you have established relationships, your questions will be more easily addressed because you will know who to contact. Do not forget to contact them to gain their perspective on pending legislation/policy so you will know how it impacts the programs for which they work, and ultimately, your constituents. Not doing so does not build trust.
- ✓ Find out what the "intake" contact numbers are for each service as in some counties they all go to one line, while in others, they can go to a different line for each individual service.
- ✓ Make sure you know whether the service/need/issue you are calling about is a government service (City or County) or provided by a private or non-profit provider. If you are uncertain, leverage your relationships noted above to learn so you will know next time.
- ✓ Your case/inquiry cannot receive any more or less priority than someone walking in the door of the service agency itself due to various federal requirements.
- ✓ You are not a program expert (and neither am I), and Google is not your friend! Never try to affirm that a constituent should or should not be eligible for any program. Most have very different eligibility standards which vary based on individual assets. Therefore, in many cases, each is assessed on a case-by case basis.
- ✓ Resist the temptation (and protect your boss too) by not expecting the service provider to divulge details about constituent's case. This is for your own protection (and the person you are calling at the agency to discuss your issue). There are federal and state confidentiality laws that prohibit counties from doing so-even if the client gives you verbal permission. Just listen, let them know that you would be happy to pass along their information to the service provider, or connect them directly with the service provider. Remember, you are the "middle man" (or woman).
