Hearing Aids

- Most common treatment: bilateral fitting
- National average costs for a single hearing aid is \$2,350
- Average person waits seven years after learning of hearing loss before buying a hearing aid.
 - Private Insurance
 - Mandated for children in N.C. up to age 22 (§ 58-3-285); all deductibles and co-insurance required
 - Insurance companies may give allowance for hearing aids e.g. \$500-1000 towards total costs. Normally is a reimbursement.
 - May have to use a specific supplier of hearing aids
 - Public Insurance
 - Medicare:
 - No adult coverage provided for hearing aids.
 - Diagnostic evaluations are covered if ordered by a physician.
 - Medicare Advantage Plan sometimes will cover the cost of one hearing aid
 - Medicaid
 - No coverage for adults in NC
 - Children covered, birth 21 years. Will cover the hearing aids and ear molds
 - Medicaid in 25 states covers hearing aids to some degree.
 - Federal Mandate: coverage through Early and Periodic Screening,
 Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) for children—mandates provision
 for ages birth to 3 years of age and 4 up to 21 if Medicaid eligible and
 deemed medically necessary

Bone Conduction Hearing Aids/Implants

- Private Insurance
 - Some private insurance companies will pay, some will not, check coverage.
- Public Insurance
 - Medicare
 - Declared implanted Osseo integrated devices as prosthetic devices, thus covering them for all ages.

- Will not cover softband Osseointegrated devices
- Medicaid
 - Bone conduction hearing aids/implants is covered for children 5 through 20 years of age. Adults are not covered. However, if an adult enters Medicaid with an implant, will continue to provide the needed external parts.
 - Will not cover soft band bone conduction hearing aids/implants after age 20

Cochlear Implants

- Private Insurance
 - Some private insurance companies will pay, some will not, check coverage
- Public Insurance
 - Medicare
 - Cochlear implantation may be covered for individuals meeting certain selection guidelines
 - Bilateral Cochlear Implantation can be covered in the case of poor localization, safety concerns and poor discrimination in noise
 - Medicaid
 - Effective 2018, implant surgery covered for all qualifying beneficiary (child and adult). Same is true for coverage of cochlear Implant processor.
- Facts to consider:
 - Not for everyone; extensive evaluation required for candidates with severe to profound hearing loss when no benefit of hearing aid use exists
 - Some Cochlear Implant models are a hybrid Cochlear Implant/Hearing Aid, preserving more low frequencies
 - Average costs range from \$70,000 to \$100,000, depending on patient needs and the center where surgery is performed; post surgical mapping and aural rehabilitation costs included

FM Systems

- Private Insurance
 - Not covered for adults or children
- Public Insurance
 - Medicare

- No Coverage
- Medicaid
 - Coverage for children birth-3 years if medically necessary
 - No coverage 3 years to adulthood

Personal Amplifiers

- Private Insurance
 - Not covered for adults or children
- Public Insurance
 - Medicare
 - No coverage
 - Medicaid
 - No coverage in NC
 - Some states cover through Medicaid based waivers programs
