Characteristics of Uninsured North Carolinians

Data Snapshot 2007-1

One of the major foci of health policy, both nationally and in North Carolina, is the uninsured. For example, the most recent session of the North Carolina General Assembly saw the development of a new insurance program for children (NC Kids' Care) and a high risk pool (the North Carolina Health Insurance Risk Pool). Developing strategies to tackle the uninsured requires an understanding of the characteristics of the uninsured. This data snapshot describes the North Carolina uninsured for 2005-2006 using data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

Labor Force Status

Full Time

- there were 626,000 uninsured who worked full time.
- 52.2 percent of the adult uninsured worked full time.
- 18.1 percent of the adults working full time were uninsured.

From 2001-2002 to 2005-2006...

- There were 150,000 more uninsured who worked full time.
- The percent of uninsured adults who worked full time increased by 6.5 percent
- The percent of adults working full time who were uninsured increased by 2.5 percent.
