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
# We know Early Childhood matters




#### **Brains are Built, Not Born**

- Early experiences are built into children's bodies—shaping brain architecture and impacting how biological systems develop
- Every experience a baby has forms a neural connection in the brain at a rate of more than a million synapses per second in the early years.
- Not all neural connections will last. Connections that get used more strengthen, and those used less fade.
- Positive early experiences **build a strong foundation** for learning and future health.



## **NC's Challenges for Young Children**

#### **Disparities in Infant Mortality**

African American births face nearly **2.5**X the infant mortality rate of white births in NC

#### **Food Insecurity**


**1 in 5** NC children face food insecurity – bottom 10 states in the nation

#### **Children in Foster Care**

Half of NC children ages 4 and 5 in foster care will have spent **over 1000** days in the system before they are adopted

#### **Reading Proficiency**

In 2019, only **36%** of NC 4<sup>th</sup> graders read proficiently and racial & ethnic disparities are profound



# What's the Plan?



NC Early Childhood Action Plan

- 10 data-informed goals for children birth through age eight
- Targeted framework to galvanize public and private action by 2025
- Governor Roy Cooper's 2018 Executive Order called for a statewide early childhood strategic plan
- Input from more than 1,500 people representative of a diversity of perspectives, including parents, families, healthcare providers, child care providers, educators, school administrators, child advocacy groups and researchers
- Focuses on alleviating inequity across North Carolina





Data Source: State Center for Health Statistics (SCHS), Division of Public Health (DPH), NC Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS)

\*Technical note: The above scale represents infant mortality rates, calculated as the number of infant (under 1 year of age) deaths divided by the total number of live births during the same time period. Rates are shown in infant deaths per 1,000 live births. Unshaded counties are those that had infant mortality rates based on small numbers (fewer than 10 deaths) and were therefore considered unstable.

#### **County Level Data Reports**

- 100 printable PDF reports available online
- Requests from counties for easier access to the data prioritized in the plan at the local level
- Desire to use county level data for:
  - Strategic planning
  - Peer county comparisons
  - Meeting existing data requirements for other local assessments



Babies across North Carolina from all backgrounds will have a healthy start in their first year of life.

- NC has the 11th highest infant mortality rate in the country.
- The African American infant mortality rate in NC is over twice as high as the white infant mortality rate.

#### **Strategies to Take Action | Examples from the Plan**

- Closing the insurance coverage gap to ensure more families have access to physical, mental, and oral healthcare services.
- Making it easier for young women to visit a primary care provider more regularly, which can help support future healthy pregnancies.
- Promoting evidence-based home visiting and parenting education classes.
- Hiring more staff in supportive roles such as school counselors, social workers, and school nurses.
- Providing better care for mothers facing depression.
- Providing increased access to research-based mental health services to children and adults who need them.



# NC has provided health & safety guidance to ensure child care programs and public schools can keep children and staff safe.

#### **Requirements & Recommendations:**

- Cloth face coverings required for students K 12 and all staff
- Daily screening for children and staff
- Cleaning protocols
- Immediately isolate staff or children with symptoms and send them home
- Consult with health department about potential exposures to COVID-19

#### For Parents/Caregivers NC as launched a child care hotline.

Families can call <u>Child Care Hotline</u> to find local care options, available Monday – Friday from 8AM-5PM.



#### **For Parents/Caregivers**

NC launched an Emergency Child Subsidy Care Program for essential workers.



- Launched for April 1 through May 31
- Covered child care for over 17,000 children of essential workers in April
- Signs ups ended May 8<sup>th</sup> when the "essential business" designation ended with Executive Order 138
- Child care providers will continue to get paid for emergency child care subsidy through end of May

#### **For Child Care Programs**

NC has paid bonuses to child care staff working on the front lines in April and May.





#### Teaching Staff: \$950/month

Non-Teaching Staff: \$525/month

# **For Child Care Programs**

NC has provided Pre-K remote learning guidance.

All NC Pre-K programs were expected to provide remote or in-person learning services to NC Pre-K children through the end of the program year

During this time, **families should expect:** 



**Real-time contact** (phone, Zoom, FaceTime) with Pre-K teachers at least 2x per week



No end of year preschool assessments while children are learning remotely

End of year discussion with teacher on child's growth at end of year (including strengths and any areas of concern)

# **For Child Care Programs**

NC conducted an interim survey of NC Pre-K sites to understand how they were providing remote learning, and will release an endof-year survey report.

- Interim survey results found:
  - 72% of NC Pre-K sites said they were serving children from families for whom English was not their primary, home language
  - Among these sites, about 1 in 4 children enrolled came from families for whom English was not their primary, home language
- NCDHHS will conduct an end of year survey to understand what worked well and what could be improved with remote learning and family engagement

# **Nutritious Food**



#### **School Nutrition Sites**

NC has provided meals to children and families at school and community sites across the state.

- Provided over 25 million meals at ~1,000 sites since March 16<sup>th</sup>
- Meal sites will continue to provide meals through summer, as we transition to school reopening



### **Finding Meals For Your Family**

NC has worked with partners to set up a texting tool to find nearby meal sites.

### **Pandemic-EBT**

NC is helping families buy food if their children who usually get free or reduced meals at school.

- About 900,000 children will qualify for benefits
- Families will receive up to \$371 per child on an EBT card to help buy food for children
- Families do not need to apply will either receive an EBT card in the mail or will get more money on an existing EBT card over next 3 weeks
- Can use EBT card at most grocery stores



# Maximum Food Benefits for Families

NC is providing families more money to buy food.

- Families who are currently enrolled in Food and Nutrition Services will receive the maximum amount allowed for March, April, and May. (based on their household size).
- NCDHHS issued ~\$76-\$80 million in benefits to over 420,000 households with over 867,000 individuals in both March and April.
- NCDHHS began issuing May benefits on 5/22 and staggered over 10 days.

#### Online Purchasing for Families Receiving FNS NC is helping families buy food online to promote social distancing.



- Families enrolled in FNS can now order food online for curbside pickup or delivery at retailers like Walmart and Amazon using FNS benefits
- In first two weeks of implementation, FNS participants spent over \$2.5 million buying groceries online using EBT cards
