FAST FACTS

Founded in 1985 to address teen pregnancy

Expanded mission to encompass sexual health in 2015

Staff of 23 – 80% of staff are dedicated entirely to local community support

Funders: CDC, Federal Office of Population Affairs, TANF & MCH Block Grant Allocations, Private state & regional foundations, Contract work

SHIFT NC builds the capacity of adults who work with young people to address sexual health

IN COMMUNITIES AND SCHOOLS

Training on evidence-based curricula, teaching skills, LGBTQ-inclusion, and trauma-informed approaches

IN CLINICS AND HEALTH SYSTEMS

Custom training to make clinics more teen-friendly, building community linking networks to help families find care, LGBTQ-inclusive practice improvement


IN FOSTER CARE AND JUVENILE DETENTION CENTERS

Resources to help increase communication between parents, teens, and healthcare providers


The State of Adolescent Health in North Carolina




North Carolina's teen pregnancy rates have fallen 77% since 1990 – and 50% since 2010

How SHIFT NC Impacts Adolescent Health





HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS

406 clinic staff trained on best practices in adolescent medicine

6,302 patients ages 15-19 received a sexual health service



FOSTER CARE/ JUVENILE JUSTICE

264 foster care & juvenile justice staff trained to provide traumainformed info and linkages to care

3,418 of NC's most vulnerable teens get support and educational resources



LGBTQ+ CAPACITY-BUILDING

64 school personnel trained to create safe and supportive schools for LGBTQ students

19,776 students get to learn in a more supportive school environment



YOUTH-SERVING ORGANIZATIONS

116 local youth-serving workers trained to provide evidence-based programs and linkages to care

1,369 youth completed an evidence-based program in their community

Patient-Centered Care

Explore and assess individual pregnancy intentions

Provide accurate and unbiased information about birth control options

Counseled around teen's priorities in a method (if interested)

LGBTQ Affirming Sexual Health Services

A Focus on Access & Prevention

Birth control method provided same-day without cost barrier

Provide STI/HIV screening, testing and treatment, per CDC guidelines

Discuss STI/HIV prevention messages

Distribute free condoms and carrying cases

Staff Training and Technical Assistance Topics

Time-alone, Confidentiality, Minor's Rights

Application of CDC's Evidence-Based Contraception Guidance


