TAKING LESSONS FROM COVID-19 FORWARD

NC Commerce Secretary Machelle Baker Sanders, MHA, chaired the North Carolina side of the <u>Carolinas Pandemic</u> <u>Preparedness Task Force</u>, which culminated in a comprehensive report with recommendations focused on:

- Access to supplies
- Infrastructure changes
- Workforce development
- Modernized surveillance
- Expansion of broadband
- Tailored communications
- New partnerships

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"Future pandemics are inevitable. The degree of devastation wrought by these pandemics will be determined by such factors as a strong health and public health infrastructure; a well-prepared workforce, a vibrant economy; effective and trusted communications; a robust social services safety net; and adequate access to equipment, supplies, diagnostic tools, and treatments."

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FORGING A STRONG FUTURE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH

Dozens of partners convened to develop a vision for the <u>Future of Local</u> <u>Public Health in North Carolina</u>, led by co-chairs Leah McCall Devlin, DDS, MPH, of UNC; Lisa Macon Harrison, MPH, of Granville-Vance Public Health; John Lumpkin, MD, MPH, of the BlueCross and BlueShield of North Carolina Foundation; and Vicki Lee Parker-High, MBA, of the North Carolina Business Council. The task force recommendations include:

"The opportunity is clear for local governmental public health to draw attention to the spectrum of roles it plays in helping create healthy communities and fully realize the value it holds in ensuring that all members of our communities have an opportunity to be healthy."

- Evolve local public health's role as Chief Health Strategist
- Transform local public health's data capabilities
- Strengthen communications
- Sustain and support current workforce
- Grow a diverse and skilled workforce
- Pursue innovative strategies
- Ensure sufficient funding



FORWARD-LOOKING AND FOCUSED ON SOLUTIONS

On November 15, we held our <u>annual health</u> <u>policy meeting</u> at McKimmon Center in Raleigh, gathering more than 300 people to discuss a healthier future for our state, with a focus on the challenges and opportunities facing our health workforce.

The event concluded with a legislative roundtable featuring Senator Gale Adcock, Senator Jim Burgin, Representative Carla Cunningham, Representative Wayne Sasser, Representative Donna White, and Senator Mike Woodard.
