Call to Order

• Dr. Carrie Rosario welcomed board members and confirmed that a quorum was present.

The Mission of NCIOM

• Andrew Kaiser read the NCIOM mission.

Celebrations

- Dr. Carrie Rosario announced celebrations and congratulations:
 - NCIOM Board Member David Sousa was appointed by Senator Berger to serve as one of three Public Members of the <u>NC Medical Board</u>.
 - NCIOM Board Member Tim Norris and his firm, Healthcare Management Consultants, were honored by *Business North Carolina* magazine as one of the Best Employers in NC.
 - NCIOM Board Member Anita Bachman was named as one of *Business North Carolina's* "Power List 2023" honoring the most influential leaders in our state.
 - NCIOM Board member Danny Scalise hosted NY Times bestselling author (*Dopesick, Raising Lazarus*) Beth Macy in Morganton on July 12th for a community discussion of the root causes of the opioid use disorder, evidence-based practices to save lives, stigma and hope.
 - The NCIOM was notified by El Futuro (Durham, NC) in June that the Kate B Reynolds Charitable Trust will fund our project focused on the mental health of immigrants to our state.

- Current Financial Position
 - Kathy reviewed the current financial position and balance in checking accounts (which does not include Duke Endowment funds and other funds expected to arrive later in the month.)

• NCIOM is in a strong financial position overall, and the Morgan Stanley financial account is trending upward consistently after having trended downwards for some time.

- Contract with UNC for FY24
 - Don Gula reviewed the UNC contract that we complete annually to plan for our permanent employee wages and other operational expenses.
 - Kathy is working with Adam Sholar and David Sousa to ensure we communicate that the NCIOM is an independent organization throughout the contract discussions, and are pleased with progress in that vein.
 - Kathy indicated that UNC HR has paused all action on employee salary increases until the state budget has passed.
- Robert Wood Johnson Fellowship to transfer to NCIOM
 - UNCG will be transferring approximately \$40,000 in remaining funds from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for the Bingham Park project through Kathy's participation in the Interdisciplinary Research Leaders fellowship. Kathy will work to prepare a local community organization to accept these funds to continue the work to remediate Bingham Park in Greensboro, NC. Our auditor has been made aware of the intent and proposed process for these transactions.
- Anchor Support
 - Process of reaching out to anchor funders came later and therefore some contributions will not be counted in FY23. When we review the audit in 2024, we will need to remember that the timing was different this year.
- FY23 Audit

President's Report

Kathy shared several celebrations, including the resumption of an in person option at board meetings; the continued evolution, development and creative thinking for Task Force processes and the NCMJ; bimonthly all staff in-person focus days; meaningful contributions from student interns; and the onboarding of Deidre Bishop, administrative project manager
